

## Wye Catchment Partnership - Information Sheet

The Wye Catchment Partnership (WCP) was established in 2014 to convene collaborative working to deliver a Catchment Based Approach plan (CaBA) that drives improvements across key issues on water quality, wildlife, and sustainable land use along the River Wye and throughout its catchment.

As a Partnership we:

- Identify gaps in knowledge
- Raise & discuss issues & opportunities
- Increase understanding & awareness
- Develop collaborative working
- Align proposals to funding streams
- Share good practice & lessons learnt

The Partnership is currently supported by over 60 organisations as well as interested individuals and has a mailing list of around 200 contacts.

The diverse membership includes representatives from Rivers Trusts, governmental organisations, farming groups, water companies, citizen science groups, conservation organisations, corporate groups, local companies and more.

- Mapping of Delivery Projects and Funding in the Wye Catchment - ongoing
- Mott MacDonald Systems Mapping Approach for modelling Issues affecting the Wye catchment
